Support for healthcare workers and patients after medical error through mutual healing: another step toward patient safety

Medical errors occur and can be devasting not only to the patient and their family but to the healthcare workers involved in the error. This study's results suggest that if there was an opportunity for an open and purposeful conversation early or before increased emotional suffering, there might be an opportunity to bridge the barriers, and help patients and HCWs heal together. This, in turn, contributes to improved health quality and patient safety. The paper may be found

directions Production pressure is often cited as a contributing factor in the patient harm event reports we receive. This comprehensive paper looks across industries to discover potential strategies that could be used to mitigate the negative impacts of production pressures. The authors analyze the research challenges, identify the existing gaps, and propose potential future research directions.


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
