Patient Safety Resources

The Overlooked Threat of Hospital Falls During the Discharge Period: A Statewide

Retrospective Analysis of Patient Safety Event Reports

The Pennsylvania Patient Safety Authority recently published a report on patient falls during the transitional period surrounding a patient's discharge from inpatient care. This previously unknown high-risk time frame for inpatient falls was identified upon their review of falls reported to them found 450 such falls. This study offers actionable insights for targeted interventions. Implementing focused strategies and integrating fall prevention into discharge planning and patient education may enhance safety and reduce the risk of serious fall-related events during this vulnerable period. American Hospital Association Infographic on Behavioral Health

Patient Safety Metrics Monitoring Across Harvard-Affiliated Hospitals: A Mixed Methods Study

The past two decades have seen a surge in available patient safety metrics. However, the variability in how health care organizations choose and monitor these metrics remains unknown. This study offers critical guidance to health policymakers on designing and mandating safety metrics. Understanding Psychological Safety in Health Care: A Qualitative Investigation and

Practical Guidance

Psychological safety is a critical teamwork competency that promotes effective communication, teamwork, patient safety, and the well-being of health care professionals. However, previous research on barriers and facilitators to promote psychological safety has focused on clinical staff, omitting other health care disciplines that contribute to patient safety and high-quality care. In this study, psychological safety was defined not just at the team level but at the individual and organizational level. The authors conclude that interventions must align with the factors at all three levels for a personalized and comprehensive approach. Find the paper [here](#).

Language-Concordant Health Care: Implementation of a Bilingual Competency Program

Language proficiency among health care professionals is essential for delivering equitable, high-quality care to patients with a non-English language preference (NELP). This study examines how implementing a Bilingual Competency Program (BCP) for diverse clinical staff enhances patient-centered care and improves the health care experience for NELP patients.
